**Special seminar:**

**“Justice, Priority and Cost-effectiveness in Health Care: Perspectives from different Countries”**

*Chairs: Fuat Oduncu & Roberto Andorno*

**Topic:**

Setting priorities, equal access to health care, scarcity of resources, cost-explosion and cost-effectiveness are on the floor in many countries and demand for urgent solutions. The total national expenditures for health care vary from 5% to 16% of the gross domestic product (GDP). The seminar will present different national health care systems and their approaches to these challenging tasks. It will be interesting and also exciting to see how different countries, nations, cultures and different laws try to cope with the challenging demands of their particular health care needs. For this, the seminar will try to provide a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary platform for discussing some of the issues at stake. Søren Holm presents in his introductory paper a rather universal and conceptual approach to the problems of justice and the need for priorities in health care. Niall Scott will give a special focus on priority and cost-effectiveness within the NICE in the UK. Björn Hofmann addresses the Scandinavian health care systems and their instruments of setting priorities. Georg Marckmann will present the highly complex German Statutory Health Insurance System and the current ethical debate on its policy of just allocation and priority setting. Frida Simonstein will give some insights into the Israeli health care system and its efforts concerning justice and priorities. Finally, Peggy Battin will close with the huge challenge of priority-setting and providing justice in the US health care system. We wish all participants an interesting and informative seminar afternoon.

**Topic:**

This workshop presents some of the work of the AlcopopTVCulture project funded by the European Commission's Daphne programme. The project brings together work in philosophy, ethics, law, social science and public health to encourage debate and reflection on the way in which alcohol is treated within society, and the way in which young people engage with alcohol. With a particular (but not exclusive focus) on the depiction of alcohol on television, the project explores:

- Alcohol use per se;
- The policies that regulate youth (and adult) alcohol consumption; and
- The exposure of young people to images of alcohol use.

A key element of the project is the involvement in of young people in reflection on these issues which govern them, and through a variety of methods the project creates dialogue between the individual, society, policy, practice and academia.
